Riversea Plantation, Bolivia

In Riversea Plantation, 1 in 4 homes listed didn't sell

In the last 12 months, 64 homes finished their time on the market in the Riversea Plantation neighborhood in Bolivia: 46 sold and 18 did not — about 1 in 4. The ones that sold took a median of 102 days, counted from the first day listed, and closed at 95.8% of their first asking price.

Solid houses sold. Outlined houses expired, were withdrawn or were canceled.

What waiting costs

A typical \$625,000 home, per month

Mortgage (principal + interest)	\$3,310
Property taxes	\$178
Homeowners insurance	\$250
Upkeep	\$521
Utilities	\$250
Total	\$4,510

About \$4,510 every month the home sits.

Listings that didn't sell stayed on the market a median of 319 days — roughly \$47,300 in holding costs, and the home still didn't sell.

An example, not a quote: 20% down, 30-year fixed at 6.95% (Freddie Mac average, 2026-09-17); Brunswick County rate 0.342 per \$100 (NC Department of Revenue, 2025-26 county rates); town taxes add more inside town limits; insurance, upkeep (1% of value a year) and utilities are typical estimates. If your home is paid off, the mortgage line drops out — the rest still adds up.

Priced right from day one vs. chasing the market

What this means if you're selling

- Homes priced right from day one sold in a median of 52 days. Homes that needed price cuts took 113 days and sold for 93.4% of their first price.
- Waiting costs money. A \$625,000 home runs about \$4,510 a month to hold — roughly \$47,300 over the time a typical unsold listing sat.
- About 1 in 4 contracts fell apart before closing. Homes that went back on the market sold for 87.8% of first asking, versus 96.3% for homes that closed on the first contract.

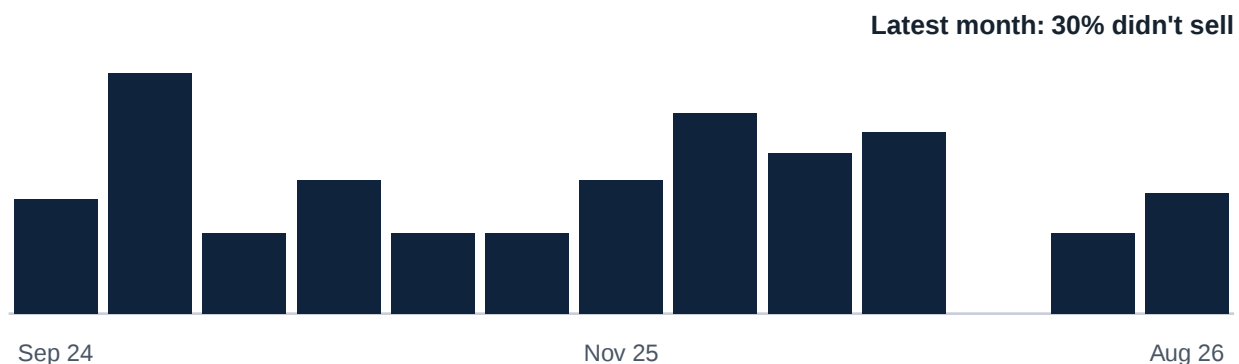

The MLS doesn't record why a contract ends. In our experience the most common reasons are home inspection findings, appraisals that come in below the price, and buyer financing — which is why preparing the home and pricing it to appraise matter before it goes on the market.

How buyers paid on closed sales: conventional loans 67% · cash 26% · VA 4% · FHA 2% · other 0%.

What this means if you're buying

- 85% of homes sold below their first asking price — the first price is often a starting point.
- Homes that sit usually sit for a reason. Listings that didn't sell stayed on the market a median of 319 days.

Did you know?

- 26% of buyers paid cash, and 4% used VA loans.
- A year earlier, 24% of listings didn't sell; now it's 28%.
- When a contract fell apart, 47% of those homes never sold at all.

How these numbers are counted

Homes only (single-family, townhomes and condos) in the last 12 months. "Didn't sell" means the listing expired, was withdrawn or was canceled; some owners take a home off the market for reasons that have nothing to do with the market. Days to sell count from the first day a home was listed, including relistings. "First asking" is the first list price.
